She primarily drafts agreements and represents clients in parentage judgments and stepparent, second parent, adult and independent adoptions. She is an active member of the National LGBT Bar Association's Family Law Institute, the Assisted Reproductive Technology Subcommittee of the American Bar Association, and the Society for Ethics in Egg Donation and Surrogacy.
